Realities on the ground

- Inequality has risen over the last15 years in the EU
- The number of people in income poverty has **risen by 8% since 2005**



The largest increases occurred during the economic crisis. But this trend has recently drawn to a halt.







Tools for change

- Inequality affects harder certain groups who are at greater risk of poverty...

...face widespread discrimination



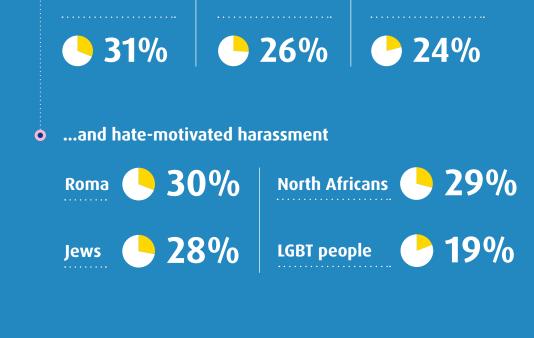
