






	<p><b>Current migration situation in the EU: separated children - December 2016</b> December 2016</p> <p>The lack of information and specific guidance for handling migrant children who are separated from their parents but travelling with other adults hampers efforts to properly protect such children from potential exploitation and abuse. This is one of the findings from the latest summary report of FRA on migration-related fundamental rights in selected EU Member States. It identifies what needs to be done to address the shortcomings in existing approaches and points to promising practices that could be used by other Member States.</p>	en
	<p><b>Antisemitism – Overview of data available in the European Union 2005-2015</b> December 2016</p> <p>This report compiles the available evidence on antisemitic incidents collected by international, governmental and non-governmental sources, covering the year 2015, where data are available. In addition, a section presents evidence from international organisations.</p>	en
	<p><b>FRA Opinion 5/2016 [Hotspots]</b> December 2016</p> <p>Without being exhaustive, the <i>Opinion of the European Union Agency for Fundamental Rights on fundamental rights in the 'hotspots' set up in Greece and Italy</i> discusses selected topics which touch certain Charter rights, identifying the challenges and describing measures that could be taken to mitigate the risk of actions, which are not compliant with the Charter.</p>	en
	<p><b>FRA Opinion – 4/2016 [Dublin]</b> December 2016</p> <p>The <i>Opinion on the impact on children of the proposal for a revised Dublin Regulation (COM(2016) 270 final; 2016/0133 COD)</i> analyses the effects on children of the proposed recast Dublin Regulation. It covers child-specific rules as well as provisions relating to all asylum applicants that significantly affect children.</p>	en
	<p><b>Guidance on how to reduce the risk of refoulement in external border management when working in or together with third countries</b> December 2016</p> <p>This guidance on how to reduce the risk of refoulement in border management situations aims to support the EU and its Member States when implementing integrated border management measures with the assistance of third countries. It also intends to mitigate possible risks of being held accountable. It is not comprehensive, and Member States have to comply with all applicable obligations both within as well as beyond the scope of these guidelines.</p>	en
	<p><b>Scope of the principle of non-refoulement in contemporary border management: evolving areas of law</b> December 2016</p> <p>EU Member States are increasingly involved in border management activities on the high seas and at the EU's borders. This report aims to encourage fundamental-rights compliant approaches to border management, including by highlighting potential grey areas. The analysis presented is complemented by concrete guidance on how to reduce the risk of refoulement in these situations.</p>	en

	<p><b>EU-MIDIS II – Second European Union Minorities and Discrimination Survey</b>  <b>Roma – Selected findings</b>                      November 2016</p> <p>Highlighting persisting barriers to employment, education, housing and health services, this report presents vital information that can serve as a unique resource for policymakers committed to ensuring that Roma are treated equally with respect to their fundamental rights. It is based on a survey that collected information on almost 34,000 persons living in Roma households in nine EU Member States.</p>	en
	<p><b>Current migration situation in the EU: hate crime - November 2016</b>                      November 2016</p> <p>Asylum seekers and migrants face various forms of violence and harassment across the EU. As this month's report on the migration situation underscores, such acts are both perpetrated and condoned by state authorities, private individuals, as well as vigilante groups. They increasingly also target activists and politicians perceived as 'pro-refugee'.</p>	en
	<p><b>Incitement in media content and political discourse in Member States of the European Union</b>                      November 2016</p> <p>Media content and political discourse in EU Member States, whether online or offline, show incitement to discrimination, hatred or violence on different grounds, as evidence collected by FRA reveals. The growing reliance on the internet as the main source of information for many enables the fast spread of often unverified statements that could also incite to hatred.</p>	en
	<p><b>Violence, threats and pressures against journalists and other media actors in the European Union</b>                      November 2016</p> <p>A free and pluralist media is vital to the democratic functioning of the EU and its Member States. However, journalists and other media actors in the EU face various challenges, including violence, threats and other forms of pressure, both direct and indirect.</p>	en
	<p><b>Criminal detention and alternatives: fundamental rights aspects in EU cross-border transfers</b>                      November 2016</p> <p>EU Member States have largely implemented, and started applying, three instruments on transferring prison sentences, probation measures and alternative sanctions, as well as pre-trial supervision measures, to other Member States. This report provides an overview of their first experiences with these measures, highlighting both best practices and shortcomings.</p>	en
	<p><b>Rights of suspected and accused persons across the EU: translation, interpretation and information</b>                      November 2016</p> <p>Persons who are suspected or accused of crimes in countries other than their own are particularly vulnerable, making appropriate procedural safeguards especially crucial. This report reviews Member States' legal frameworks, policies and practices regarding the important rights provided in directives, including with respect to individuals whose needs may require additional attention, such as persons with disabilities and children.</p>	en

	<p><b>Key migration issues: one year on from initial reporting – October 2016</b> October 2016</p> <p>Over the year 2015, responses to the migration situation in the EU have directly affected several fundamental rights referred to in the Charter of Fundamental Rights, as reported in FRA’s monthly reports on the migration situation. This focus outlines some of the persistent key issues in four areas of concern that have emerged since September 2015, namely: unaccompanied children; safety and protection at reception facilities; impact on local communities; and violence and hate speech against migrants.</p>	en
