Issues in the fundamental rights institutional landscape	No important development in 2019.
. EU Charter of Fundamental Rights	The EU Charter of Fundamental Rights was neither analysed nor interpreted in court cases or draft legislation in 2019. It remains merely referred to as one of the sources of international law.
Equality and non-discrimination	Regulation on co-habiting unmarried couples rejected. The parliament rejected the draft Unmarried Couple's Law (Dzīvesbiedru likums) that would have foreseen legal status for co-habiting unmarried partners (both same sex and opposite sex couples).

Chapter 1. Equality and non-discrimination

1. Legal and policy developments in 2019 relevant to combating discrimination based on gender identity, religion or belief, disability, age or sexual orientation

In February, 27 enterprises and NGOs signed Diversity Charter - a voluntary commitment to promote diversity and equal treatment of staff. The Charter includes 15 diversity and equality principles the companies agreed to introduce in their management. The initiative is part of the EU Diversity Charter initiative and addresses all grounds of discrimination.

On 29 April, the Latvian government supported the response prepared by the Ministry of Justice (*Tieslietu ministrija*) rejecting the recommendations by the Ombudsperson (*Tiesībsargs*) calling for the provision of a legal framework for the recognition of different family models in line with the latest ECtHR cases and Article 110 of the Satversme (*Constitution*). It maintained that the introduction of registered heterosexual and same-sex partnerships was an issue of a political choice, which is the prerogative of the legislator. The Latvian legislator had recently rejected codifying registered partnerships in a law.² In October 2018, the Ombudsperson issued an extensive opinion in a case following an individual complaint alleging discrimination on grounds of sexual orientation. The case concerned an inheritance agreement whereby the state fee when inheriting immovable property for persons who are not spouses or 1st to 4th degree relative of the deceased, is 60 times higher than for spouses or direct relatives.³ Latvia does not recognise either same sex marriage or partnership.

On 20 June, the parliament rejected the draft Unmarried Couple's Law (*Dzīvesbiedru likums*) that would have foreseen legal status for co-habiting unmarried partners (both same sex and opposite sex couples). It was proposed by the liberal Development/For! (*Attīstībai/Par!*) party and Unity (*Vienotība*) party of the governing coalition, and 23 MPs voted for, 60 MPs against and one abstained for the draft law to be passed for review to the relevant parliamentary commissions.

Riga City Council (*Rīgas dome*) approved the Riga City Society Integration Guidelines 2019 – 2014.⁶ The Action plan for the implementation of the guidelines 2019-2021 includes measures aimed at the promotion of civic participation and cooperation, intercultural dialogue and tolerance, state language (Latvian), social inclusion, access to information, access to city environment and integration measures. Specifically measures include the provision of financial support to projects aimed at the improvement of teachers' professional competence in working with children of migrant background and their parents; the provision of Latvian language courses to migrants; facilitating employment and inclusion in education of persons at risk of social exclusion, especially persons with mental disabilities and special needs.⁷

On 16 December, the Constitutional Court (*Satversmes tiesa*) initiated proceedings regarding the conformity of Section 155, Paragraph one of the Labour Law (*Darba likums*)⁸ with first sentence of Section 110 of the Constitution of Latvia according to which state protects and support marriage – union between man and woman, family, parents and children rights. The applicant who is in same sex relationship and has lived in a joint household for more than 10 years wanted to exercise the right for a 10 day parental leave after the birth of a child in the family. However, the provision of the Labour Law limits such right to the father of the child and not to the partner of the child's biological mother, although in the particular situation she is one of the parents of the new born child. In the applicant's view, the legislator has not established a system of social and economic protection for same sex families and their children.⁹

2. Research findings, studies or surveys on either experiences of discrimination or rights awareness

No research, studies or surveys on experiences of discrimination, rights awareness and/or reporting of discrimination have been published in 2019.

Chapter 2. Racism, xenophobia and related intolerance

1. Legal, policy developments and measures relating to the application of the Racial **Equality Directive**

There were no specific measures related to the application of the Racial Equality Directive.

Activities of the communication campaign "Openness is a value" "(Atvērtība ir vērtība) in 2019, coordinated by the Society Integration Foundation (Sabiedrības integrācijas fonds), focus on ethnic discrimination. According to a poll conducted in the framework of the campaign, the highest social distance is towards Roma, Afghans, Pakistanis, Syrians, persons of African descent, and Indians. 60% of Latvian residents responded that they do not want to work together with a person of other ethnic origin, especially Roma - 33%, Afghans- 30%, Pakistanis - 29%, Syrians - 26%, people of African descent - 25%. 47% of respondents do not want to have Roma as their family members, 44% - Pakistanis, 43% - Afghans, 42% - people of African descent. 26% do not want to have Roma among neighbours, 27% - Afghans, 26% - Pakistanis and Syrians, 24% - people of African descent.¹⁰

In March, an online labour exchange platform 'Openness is a value' was launched in the framework of the campaign. The online platform has been set up with an aim to draw attention to the problem of ethnic discrimination and prejudice in the Latvian labour market. The online platform allows persons to submit their CVs and to receive information about enterprises open to diversity.11

State Employment Agency (Nodarbinātības valsts aģentūra) launched a web platform "First steps to work" for the integration of persons with refugee and subsidiary status into the labour market. The website provides guidance about the basic work related issues. The website was launched in the framework of the project "Integration of refugees and persons with alternative status in the Latvian labour market" funded by the European Social Fund. The project includes information sessions to asylum seekers about work opportunities in Latvia and individual consultations.¹²

2. Legal, policy developments and measures relating to the application of the Framework **Decision on Racism and Xenophobia**

The new Law on Administrative Liability (Administratīvas atbildības likums) adopted in October 2018 introduces a new aggravating circumstance: if the motive of the offence is hatred against such individual characteristics as race, religious belief, ethnic origin and other explicitly identifiable characteristics. 13 The Law will come into force on 1 January 2020. The new law is elaborated with an aim to modernise the existing law on administrative liability and it replaces the Soviet era Latvian Administrative Violations Code (Latvijas Administratīvo pārkāpumu kodekss) which had undergone numerous amendments. The Law on Administrative Liability relates to the administrative misdemeanours. The Law targets private, legal persons, and public officials. The Law provides for the definition of administrative violation, forms of punishment

and procedure of imposing administrative offences. The old code provided for administrative offences and penalties, while the new law will regulate the definition, types of punishment and administrative procedure. The new law introduces fine units. Specific offences will be listed in laws that regulate separate sectoral laws, e.g. Commercial Law, Law on Fisheries, etc.

European Commission against Racism and Intolerance (ECRI) published fifth monitoring cycle report on Latvia on 5 March 2019. ECRI recommends the authorities to establish a unit within the State Police tasked with reaching out to vulnerable groups in order to increase trust in the police and address the problem of under-reporting of hate crimes. It is one of the two priority recommendations Latvia has to report about as to the follow-up within two years. ECRI recommends that the authorities encourage and promote counter-speech among high-level political representatives and other public figures in response to hate speech. ECRI also recommends that the authorities establish a comprehensive data collection system for hate crime incidents. ¹⁴

Chapter 3. Roma integration

1. Measures and developments addressing Roma/Travellers segregation

ECRI fifth monitoring cycle report on Latvia of 5 March 2019 recommends that the Latvian authorities take more effective steps to improve the situation of Roma children in the education sector. According to the ECRI findings, out of a total of 900 Roma pupils enrolled in schools, 34.2% were enrolled in special needs programmes. Latvia is urged to take immediate action to remedy the situation for Roma pupils who have been wrongly placed in special needs programmes; ensure that a sufficient number of Roma teaching assistants are employed; and make the positions of existing Roma mediators permanent and assess if additional mediators are required. ECRI recommends that the authorities ensure that the State Employment Agency (*Valsts nodarbinātības aģentūra*) offers professional and vocational training also for persons with very low levels of formal education in order to benefit those members of the Roma community who have been hitherto excluded.¹⁵

According to the figures provided to ECRI by the Ministry of Education and Science (*Izglītības un zinātnes ministrija*), out of a total of 900 Roma pupils enrolled during the school year 2016/17 in Latvia, more than one third (34.2%) were enrolled in special needs programmes. In the special primary education programme for students with learning disabilities 22.4% of pupils were Roma children, in spite of the fact that Roma account for less than 1% of the country's population. In the special primary education programme for students with mental development disorders, the ratio is even higher at 39%.

2. Policy and legal measures and developments directly or indirectly addressing Roma/Travellers inclusion

Amendments to the General Education Law (*Vispārējās izglītības likums*) of 21 June 2018 concerning certain special education programmes for pupils with physical development (mobility) impairment, somatic symptom disorders, speech disorders, with learning difficulties foresee that they will no longer be implemented in special education schools, but will be integrated in mainstream schools. The amendments will come into force in 2020. Until 1 September 2020, children with these disorders will remain in special education institutions (See Chapter on UNCRPD). According to the Ministry of Education and Science, around 130 Roma students will be integrated in general education institutions implementing primary (grades 1-9) or secondary education programmes (Grades 10-12). Nevertheless, there is no information whether it will lead to the reassessment of their diagnosis.

Ministry of Culture (*Kultūras ministrija*) conducted a number of activities aimed at Roma integration in the framework of a project "Latvian Roma Platform III- dialogue, participation and mutual leaning" (*Latvijas romu platforma III: sadarbības un līdzdalības veicināšana*). Five Roma mediators provided assistance to 125 families during the project. A two-day seminar "Women in communities and in action" (*Sievietes kopienā un darbībā*) was conducted on 17-18 April. The aim of the seminar was to empower Roma women, promote their civic participation, and build cooperation with active non-Roma women. 14 Roma women from different Latvian

regions took part in the seminar. Workshop "Sāre Khetene 2019" for Roma young people and development of their communication skills was conducted on 26 and 27 June. 17 Roma young people took part in the event.¹⁷

In July, the Ministry of Culture started the next stage of the project "Latvian Roma Platform IV – dialogue, participation and mutual learning." The projects aims to support mutual learning and exchange of best practices in key areas of Roma integration at local and regional level and to promote the participation and effective involvement of Roma civil society representatives in the implementation of Roma integration policies. The project includes exchange of good practices among municipalities, the provision of support to five Roma mediators trained during previous projects in five localities – Riga, Jelgava, Valmiera, Ventspils and Viļaka region; practical workshops for Roma youth; Baltic women capacity building seminar. The total project budget is € 64,999. ¹⁸

Chapter 4. Asylum, visas, migration, borders and integration

Unaccompanied children reaching the age of majority

Area of support	Description
Residence permit Reception conditions Directive (article 6 and 7) and Qualification Directive (articles 24 and 31)	No changes and amendments regarding the residence permits for unaccompanied children have been made in legislation and policies in 2019. Asylum Law (<i>Patvēruma likums</i>) stipulates that unaccompanied children asylum seekers receive the residence permit according to the granted status of international protection. During the asylum procedure they are entitled to stay in the territory of Latvia and be accommodated in the accommodation centre premises, foster families or in child care institutions. In other cases, unaccompanied children are granted the residence permit according to the Immigration Law (<i>Immigrācijas likums</i>), ²⁰ if there are legal grounds to enter and stay in the country. Office of Citizenship and Migration Affairs (<i>Pilsonības un migrācijas lietu pārvalde</i>) is entitled to grant the temporary residence permit to unaccompanied children whose life or health is at risk if returning to the country of origin. The residence permit is granted until the situation in the country of origin changes. ²¹

	Children who have reached 18 but were enrolled in the educational establishment before 18, can be granted temporary residence permit by the decision of the head of the OCMA on humanitarian grounds until they receive secondary education. ²² The temporary residence permit is issued for a time period up to 5 years based on humanitarian grounds and also in compliance with international legal norms (the best interests of the child could be protected more effectively on that particular legal ground) by the Head of the Office of Citizenship and Migration Affairs. ²³	
Guardianship (representative under Reception Conditions Directive Article 24.1)	No changes regarding the guardianship when the unaccompanied child reaches 18 have been made in legislation and policies in 2019.

	Guardianship is not extended after 18 (that is the general practice also for locals), but the Orphans' (child custody) court has to establish, if the guardian (the head of the care institution) has informed the local government on the necessity to provide housing for such a person. ²⁵ If the housing is not provided, the Orphans' court does not decide on the termination of the social care in the institution. Therefore, the housing issue has to be addressed by the local government after the request from the head of the care institution under the supervision of the Orphans' court.

	Unaccompanied minors are not placed in the adult accommodation independently of the asylum procedure (if detained, then in a separated block in the Detention Centre, otherwise - in the social care institution for children). Regarding the after-care support only NGO "Dardedze" provides social rehabilitation services for children, parents, victims of violence. NGO "Sustento" and "Apeirons" provides assistance for persons with disability. The Ombudsperson's Office could assist in the communication between the former child and officials, if problems with housing benefits or accommodation occur. According to Section 9 Part 6 of the Asylum Law ²⁶ , special accommodation requirements are applicable for minors. Minors in Latvia are persons under the of age 18, as provided in Section 3 Part 1 of the Law on the Protection of Children's Rights (Bērnu tiesību aizsardzības likums) ²⁷ . No exceptions are provided in the Asylum Law, therefore upon reaching the age of 18, individuals are entitled to adult accommodation, meaning that if at this age the person is still under asylum procedure, he or she will be accommodated in the Accommodation Centre together with other adults (considering safety, compatibility, health conditions etc.).
Return Directive, Article 10	No developments took place in 2019. According to the Section 50 ⁸ Paragraph 1 of the Immigration Law, the OCMA and the State Border Guard (<i>Valsts Robežsardze</i>) inform the State Police (<i>Valsts Policija</i>) and the Orphan's Court (<i>Bāriņtiesa</i>) before the return procedure in order to proceed with it in compliance with the rights of the child. If the identity of the unaccompanied child has been established, the State Border Guard together with the Consular Service (<i>Konsulārais dienests</i>) contact the responsible institutions in the country of origin with the purpose of delivering the child to family members or responsible institution. Persons after the age of 18 are provided the same quality of assistance, i.e., they are returned to the country of origin if it is safe and transferred to the State Border Guard. The Ombudsperson's Office is responsible for monitoring the compliance of the return procedure with human rights standards with no right to interfere with the return procedure. ²⁸

Chapter 5. Information society, data protection

1. Activities developed and launched by national data protection supervisory authorities (SAs) to implement and enforce the GDPR

During the first year since the implementation of the GDPR, the Data State Inspectorate ($Datu\ valsts\ inspekcija$) practised "consult first" principle aimed at providing support to public and private institutions and promoting common understanding about the GDPR instead of imposing fines. From 1 January until 17 December 2019, Data State Inspectorate received 1,197 complaints and initiated 107 verification cases on possible violations of data processing and protection. The fines in the amount from \in 300 to \in 150,000 were imposed in 14 cases³⁰. According to the head of the Data State Inspectorate, despite the fact that their workload has increased since the introduction of the GDPR, funding for 2019 remained in the same amount as in 2018 and it is the lowest SAs budget among all EU member states. Low budget hinders the performance of more active informative measures and supervisory activities. In the lowest SAs budget among all EU member states.

Latvian Association of Information and Communication Technologies (*Latvijas Informācijas un komunikācijas tehnoloģiju asociācija*, *LIKTA*) in cooperation with the Data State Inspectorate elaborated guidelines on the processing of personal data of natural persons for information and communication technology area. The guidelines clarify the duties of personal data processors regarding data processing during the provision of electronic communication services and promote the implementation of good practice.³² LIKTA aims at promoting the setting-up of an information society, educating the public and individuals, informing about information and communication technology, improving and developing public awareness and capacity in the field of information and communication technology.

Data State Inspectorate conducted a number of informative activities before the European Parliament elections. It prepared an informative material about data processing during elections for political parties, including a questionnaire for the assessment of the impact of data protection measures, issued and distributed materials for voters about their rights in the context of personal data protection, took part in a number of seminars related to the elections, provided consultations to the Central Election Committee (*Centrālā vēlēšanu komisija*) on the assessment of the impact on data protection, and to the Office of Citizenship and Migration Affairs (*Pilsonības un migrācijas lietu pārvalde*) about the compliance of the planned data processing with the data protection principles.³³

In October, State Data Inspectorate issued recommendations for processing of data in small and medium size companies. The aim of the recommendations is to help companies to understand and comply with the requirements of the GDPR and to prevent data security breaches.³⁴

In November, the Association of Latvian Certified Data Protection Specialists (*Latvijas Sertificētu datu aizsardzības speciālistu asociācija*) published guidelines for schools and kindergartens "Child data in schools and kindergartens or 20 topical questions about data processing in educational establishments" (*Bērnu dati skolās un bērnudārzos jeb 20 aktuālie jautājumi par datu apstrādi izglītības iestādēs*). The guidelines provide recommendations for the arrangement of data processing and personal data protection in compliance with the GDPR in educational establishments.³⁵ The association of Latvian Certified Data Protection Specialists is a professional association of data protection specialists and its functions include raising awareness of the rights of individuals in the field of data protection and providing advice to natural persons in breach of their rights and legitimate interests.

Chapter 6. Rights of the child

1. Procedural safeguards for children who are suspects in criminal proceedings

Legislative changes	No legislative measures taken during 2019 for the transposition and implementation of Directive 2016/ 800 . The directive was already transposed in 2018.
Policy developments	In the framework of a non-formal adult education programme for police officers, State Police College (<i>Valsts policijas koledža</i>) offers training "Child's rights protection". The training is aimed at proper investigation and prosecution of crimes involving children and to ensure the interests of child victims or witnesses of crime and children suspected or accused in crime. The training contains specific modules on interrogation of children and intersectional cooperation while working with children during criminal proceedings.

2. Legal and policy measures or initiatives developed about child internet safety

In July 2019, the Cabinet of Ministers (*Ministru kabinets*) adopted the Plan for the protection of children from criminal offences against morality and sexual integrity 2019-2020 (*Par Plānu nepilngadīgo aizsardzībai no noziedzīgiem nodarījumiem pret tikumību un dzimumneaizskaramību 2019.-2020. gadam*). The Plan is aimed at primary prevention: informing all groups in the society about the risk of sexual abuse of children improving the ability to identify these crimes and raise awareness on how to act in such cases; secondary prevention: to establish a system so that persons at high risk of abuse know where to seek help; tertiary prevention: to establish a stable support system for children suffering from sexual abuse, and introduce preventive coercive measures for ex-offenders who have a high risk of committing violent or sexual crime repeatedly. The Plan includes multi-sectoral cooperation between different state institutions and NGOs. Among specific activities, the Plan provides for the set-up of a helpline for children to provide consultations about sexual violence, including child safety on theinternet. According to the plan, the helpline will provide 200 consultations per year.³⁶

On 22 November, the Ministry of Culture (*Kultūras ministrija*) published draft amendments to the Law on Electronic Mass Media (*Elektronisko plašsaziņas līdzekļu likums*) for public discussion and proposals. The aim of the draft law is to transpose the Audiovisual Media Services Directive. The draft law stipulates that video-sharing platform service providers have to take appropriate measures to protect children against content which may harm their physical, mental or moral development and restrict content which contains child pornography. Electronic mass media should not distribute audio and audio-visual programmes produced on request or services containing content which may harm the physical, mental and moral development of

children, except from 10 p.m. until 7 a.m. or where the electronic media provides limited access control. Such audio-visual programmes must be preceded by an acoustic warning tone and must be specifically marked with a visual symbol describing the potentially harmful nature of the content. Both video-sharing platforms and electronic mass media have to elaborate publicly accessible code of conduct setting out the basic principles of action, accepted conditions for ethical action, rules on unacceptable audio and audio-visual commercial communications, including those targeting children, which may have a negative impact on their psychological or physical health. The code of conduct should also include provisions relating to audio-visual commercial communications for children on food and drink containing nutrients and substances with a certain nutritional or physiological effect for which overconsumption is not recommended.³⁷

Latvian Safer Internet Cenre (*Latvijas Drošāka interneta centrs*) is the main organisation working on child internet safety issues. In 2019, it published several informative materials on child safety on the internet for parents and children, and conducted seminars in schools. It also provides psychological consultations via Helpline 116111.³⁸

Chapter 7. Access to justice including crime victims

1. Victims' Rights Directive

There have been no developments concerning Victims' Rights Directive in 2019.

2. Violence against women

No major developments or negative aspects have taken place in 2019 regarding the violence against women.

A new government was formed in Latvia on 23 February 2019. However, the ratification of the Council of Europe Convention on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence (Istanbul convention) was stalled as only two of the five government coalition partners were in favour of the ratification.³⁹

Chapter 8. Developments in the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

1. CRPD policy & legal developments

As of 1 September, assistant's service is available for persons with disabilities during the education process in higher educational establishments and in professional first level higher educational establishments. According to the amendments to the Cabinet Regulation "Procedures on granting and financing assistant's services in municipality, higher educational establishment and college" ($K\bar{a}rt\bar{\iota}ba$, $k\bar{a}d\bar{a}$ pieskir un finansē asistenta pakalpojumu pašvaldībā, augtskolā un koledžā), the assistant's service is available for students with functional disability who are not able to move independently outside of the living place. The service includes assistance in going to the educational establishment and back and assisting during learning process up to 40 hours per week. The social service of the municipality is responsible for the provision of the service.

The Cabinet of Ministers approved the "Plan for the development of environmental accessibility in Latvia for 2019 – 2021" (*Plāns pieejamas vides veidošanai Latvijā 2019.-2021. gadam*) elaborated by the Ministry of Welfare. The plan was elaborated in accordance with the guidelines for the implementation of the CRPD for 2014-2020 and CRPD recommendations about for environmental accessibility given to Latvia in 2017.

The aim of the plan is to increase the number of electronic services, public buildings and places designed in accordance with the principles of universal design and make those accessible to all groups of society, including persons with disabilities. The plan aims to ensure that public and local authorities and their services, including electronic, are available to persons with disabilities regardless of age and social status by 2030. The implementation of the plan names the organisation representing persons with disabilities as the main partners in the assessment of the development of universal design and its quality control.⁴¹

Reference details	Constitutional Court, judgement in case No. 2018-25-01 "On Compliance of Section 504 of the Sentence Execution Code of Latvia with Article 91 of the Constitution of the Republic of Latvia".
Key facts of the case (max. 500 chars)	The case was initiated with respect to an application submitted by a prisoner who is serving a prison sentence in a closed prison at the lowest level of sentence regime (maximum security). The applicant argued that the contested norm - Section 504 of the Sentence Execution Code of Latvia (Latvijas Sodu izpildes kodekss) - is incompatible with the equality principle included in Article 91 of the <i>Constitution</i> because it establishes differential treatment of sentenced men i.e., men, who have been sentenced for serious and grave crimes, must serve their sentence in a closed prison, but women – in a semi-closed prison. Accordingly, the scope of the rights and obligations that these persons have in prisons, are said to differ.
Main reasoning/argumentation (max. 500 chars)	In the given case, men and women, who have committed a serious or a grave crime, have been sentenced to imprisonment and are serving their sentence, are in similar and comparable circumstances. The Court found that the contested norm envisaged differential treatment of persons who were in similar and comparable circumstances. I.e., depending on the prison, where the convicted prisoner starts serving the prison sentence, the scope of rights and restrictions defined for sentenced men and women in each level of sentence serving regime differs, first and foremost, with respect to the sentenced prisoner's right to contacts with their relatives. Thus, most significantly, it is manifested in the restrictions on the right to private life.
Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	A legal regulation, which only on the basis of gender criterion, without taking into account the individual needs and risks of each sentenced prisoner, envisages a stricter regime for sentenced men for serving their prison sentence, as well as different rights and restrictions linked to it (in particular, with respect to restrictions on private life) compared to sentenced women, does not ensure that the rights of sentenced prisoners are respected. Likewise, it does not ensure that the families of sentenced men have the same protection as the families of sentenced women and, inter alia, infringes on the bests interests of the children of sentenced men. A legislator may not use considerations of economic nature to justify why a regulation that envisages differential treatment of convicted men has not been reviewed for years. Thus, the Court recognised that there were no objective and reasonable grounds for the differential treatment of convicted men.
Results (sanctions) and key consequences or implications of the case (max. 500 chars)	The Constitutional Court held that Section 504 of the Sentence Execution Code of Latvia, insofar as differential treatment of convicted men established in it, lacks objective and reasonable grounds, as being incompatible with Article 91 of the Constitution of the Republic of Latvia and shall be declared void as of 1 May 2021.

The first instance court partly satisfied the applicant's claim. However, the appeal instance court decided to leave the applicant's claim without consideration arguing that out-of-court proceedings were not exhausted because such violation has to be considered first by the State Data Inspectorate (Datu Valsts inspekcija).
Main reasoning/argumentation (max. 500 chars)	Through the analyses of GDPR and national regulations, the Senate concluded that the State Data Inspectorate is an independent supervisory authority in the personal data protection and its competence includes issuing of administrative acts and imposing legal obligations. However, it is not functionally superior authority vis-à-vis other national regulatory

	authorities. The data subject is not obliged to apply directly to the Inspectorate in order to challenge the conduct of another national regulatory authority in relation to the processing of personal data.
Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	The judicial and supervisory authorities are alternative redress mechanisms and the data subject has the right to use one or the other. GDPR does not require that it is necessary to establish that the processing of personal data contradicts the GDPR in order to be able to use the right for judicial remedy. The Article 79 of GDPR stipulates that the data subject has the right for judicial remedy whenever he or she considers that his or her rights under GDPR have been infringed.
Results (sanctions) and key consequences or implications of the case (max. 500 chars)	The Senate cancelled the decision of the appeal instance court and sent the application for repeated revision.

Key facts of the case (max. 500 chars)	The criminal proceedings were initiated following the information received by the police from a medical institution about a possible criminal offence. The information about the criminal offence was confirmed during the interview of the victim. The first instance court found the offender guilty in accordance with the Section 130 Part 2 of the Criminal Law (Krimināllikums) for committing intentional infliction of light bodily injury. The appeal court upheld the ruling. The proceedings before the Senate were opened on the basis of the cassation complaint, submitted by the defence counsel of the accused. According to the complaint the court has committed a serious violation of the Criminal Procedure Law

	(Kriminālprocesa likums) as criminal proceedings had to be terminated because there was no application (complaint) from the victim.
Main reasoning/argumentation (max. 500 chars)	The Senate upheld the legal reasoning provided by the appeal court according to which the fact that the victim came to the police and gave his statement about the incident shows that his purpose was to report the beating and to bring the offender to justice. The victim has never changed his intention to reach a just outcome within the criminal proceedings. Therefore, the Senate decided that there is no exclusive legal argument in the proceedings provided in Section 377 Paragraph 8 of the Criminal Procedure Law that would lead to the inadmissibility of the criminal proceedings.
Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	Criminal proceedings shall not be terminated solely due to the fact that there is no formal victim's application when the bodily harm has been medically established and the victim expressed no wish to discontinue criminal proceedings. Therefore, the accused person (offender) shall be brought to justice as a result of a fair criminal trial.

The materials of the criminal proceedings show that in the particular case, information about the possible criminal offence was received from a medical institution [] In none of the case documents, the victims has expressed an opinion that he does not wish that the [person A] (the offender) would not be held criminally liable for bodily injuries.
