Issues in the fundamental rights institutional landscape	Judgements of the CJEU on the Supreme Court. The CJEU ruled that the Polish provisions lowering the retirement age of judges of the Supreme Court, are contrary to EU law and breaches the principle of the irremovability of judges. In November 2019, the CJEU issued a judgement outlining the criteria of assessing the independence of the Supreme Court Disciplinary Chamber and the National Council of Judiciary. These two

On 5 November 2019 the CJEU issued a ruling concerning the lowering of the retirement age of judges of Polish common courts. In its decision, the CJEU found that introducing different retirement age for man (65 years) and women (60 years) was not in compliance with the principle of equal status of men and women.	
Equality and non-discrimination	The Constitutional Tribunal's ruling lowering the protection of LGBTI persons. The Constitutional Tribunal ruled that a provision of the Code of Petty Crimes punishing unjustified refusal to deliver publicly available service is incompatible with the principle of the rule of law and declared it unconstitutional.	
Racism, xenophobia & Roma integration	CERD recommendations concerning combating racism in Poland. Furthermore, the funds from the EU's Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund (AMIF) for NGOs were not redistributed fully at the national level, which resulted in the lack of systemic legal assistance to asylum seekers and returnees.

So far, there is no information confirmed by the results of research showing how the implementation of the GDPR influenced the work of the national data protection supervisory office. The office's annual report for 2018, published in 2019, shows, however, a slight increase in complaints brought to the office after 25 May 2018.	
Rights of the child	Changes in the Criminal Code. In 2019, the act amending the Criminal Code was passed. The new provisions increase criminal sanctions for sexual abuse of a child. In particular, the law provides that for raping a child, offenders will be imprisoned for even 30 years and the most serious pedophilic crimes will never be time-barred. The amendment had been referred to the Constitutional Tribunal by the President and, as of January 2020, did not come into force yet.	
Access to justice, including victims of crime	The ministry ceased to finance a helpline for children. The most important change relating to victim support system in 2019 concerned the lack of financing for a helpline dedicated to children and teenagers. Without any comprehensive justification, the Ministry of National Education refused financing for the only phone help service for children and teenagers.

Chapter 1. Equality and non-discrimination

1. Legal and policy developments in 2019 relevant to combating discrimination based on gender identity, religion or belief, disability, age or sexual orientation

In the area of equality and non-discrimination there have been no significant legislative changes, except the law on supplementary benefits for persons with disability who are completely unable to live independently. The Act on the supplementary benefit grants the right to a fixed allowance of PLN 500 per month for disabled persons over 18 years of age. It provides however that the total amount of this benefit and other public benefits may not exceed PLN 1.6 thousand.¹

The issue of greatest concern remains the protection of LGBT persons from verbal and physical attacks. First of all, the struggle with the LGBT "ideology" has become a part of the political campaign of the governing party, the Law and Justice (*Prawo i Sprawiedliwość*, *PIS*), and moral teaching by some high representatives of the Polish Episcopates. Symptomatically, the archbishop of Cracow has called the LGBT community a plague. During the sermon on August 1, 2019 at St. Mary's Basilica in Cracow, delivered as part of the celebration of the 75th anniversary of the outbreak of the Warsaw Uprising, he emphasized that the struggle for Polish independence continues, indicating new threats to a free Poland. Referring to the Communist times, he said that "[t]he red plague no longer walks on our land, but a new, neo-Marxist one appeared, ready to take control of our souls, hearts and minds. Not red, but rainbow." Later, in an interview, he explained that he did not attempt to incite hatred or violence against gay persons, but was critical of the "LGBT ideology". The Center for Monitoring Racial and Xenophobic Behaviour notified the prosecutor's office that a crime had been committed in this case. Notably, the archbishop continues his public crusade against the LGBT people. In his recent letters he criticizes municipalities for introducing and financing WHO courses on sexual education in kindergardens and primary schools.²

Second, the participation in legally organized gay prides, as well as live coverage of these events by journalists has become a high-risk activity in some cities. In Białystok the participants of a peaceful march were attacked by counterdemonstrators ("patriots" or football fans) who threw stones, petards, bottles and eggs. The police had to protect the march against the counterdemonstrators with tear gas. Currently, the prosecution's office is carrying out dozens proceedings in cases related to the Gay Pride in Białystok. Notably, one of the parallel marches of supporters of traditional family values was organized by the head of the provincial government who is a member of the ruling Law and Justice party.³ Another incident happened in Lublin where the police stopped a couple carrying a homemade bomb to a counterdemonstation. They were arrested for possessing a dangerous explosive device. Overall, in Lublin, 38 people were detained during the Second Equality March and they may face

charges of active participation in a mob, public provocation to commit a crime, active assault on an officer or violation of an officer's immunity.⁴ A similar incident occurred during the most recent pride in Wrocław.

Third, the organization of gay prides in Polish cities remains a controversial issue and some mayors continue to ban such assemblies. In 2019 such bans were issued in Lublin and Nowy Sącz, but on the appeal courts quashed them as unjustified. In both cases the decision to ban a gay pride was dictated by the need to protect counterdemonstrators and prevent disruption of public order.

In June 2019, the Constitutional Tribunal found a provision of the Petty Offence Act, punishing for an unjustified refusal to deliver publicly available services, as incompatible with the Constitution. The motion for the constitutional review was submitted by the Prosecutor General after two lower courts had found guilty the printer who refused to take the printing oder from a foundation supporting LGBT persons. The Tribunal ruled that the challenged provision infringes the principle of the rule of law as it may lead to such interpretations that are incompatible with freedom of conscience.⁵ According to the Ombudsman, the provision declared unconstitutional was in fact implementing the principle of equal treatment. Although it originated from the Communist times, it was in line with the Racial Equality Directive since it prohibited unjustified denials of publicly available services on any ground, including race or ethnicity. In the opinion of the Ombudsman, the Parliament should remedy the gap created by declaring this provision unconstitutional and adopt new laws that would effectively prevent segregation of clients in the market of services on the basis of their personal characteristics such as gender, age, race, nationality, disability or sexual orientation.⁶

Last but not least, the Parliament adopted legislative changes regarding the retirement age of judges of the Supreme Court and the Supreme Administrative Court.⁷ This amendment came as a reaction to the interim order by the Court of Justice of the European Union in the case C-618/19 R *Commission v. Poland.*⁸ The interim order required that the Polish government suspends the application of the provisions of the impugned Act on the Supreme Court with regard to the retirement of judges who reached 65 years of age, reinstates judges who have already retired under the new legislation, and refrains from any action to appoint new judges to vacancies arising from this forceful retirement.⁹ Under the new law the term of office of the Supreme Court and the Supreme Administrative Court judges is considered as uninterrupted. However, the affected judges may remain retired if, within seven days of



Chapter 2. Racism, xenophobia and related intolerance

1. Legal, policy developments and measures relating to the application of the Racial Equality Directive

There were neither legal nor policy developments concerning application of the Racial Equality Directive. On the contrary, there is a regress in this area. According to the study on the Legal Awareness in the Context of Equal Treatment presented by the Ombudsman on 1 March 2019, the International Day without Discrimination,. Poles observe an increasing occurrence of various types of discrimination In particular, the increase concerns discrimination based on race, ethnicity or nationality, disability, and religion. However, the respondents perceive discrimination based on race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or nationality and gender identity as the most frequent. According to this study, Poles are more willing to accept people from Ukraine, and but they are the least tolerant towards Muslims and people with schizophrenia.

2. Legal, policy developments and measures relating to the application of the Framework Decision on Racism and Xenophobia

During the Second Congress of Polish Lawyers, which took place on June 1, 2019 in Poznań, a resolution was adopted, which emphasized that hate speech is one of the most serious threats to the sustainability of civil society and democracy. During the event, the Social Codification Commission proposed amendments to the Criminal Code regarding counteraction to hate speech. They include increasing the sentence if the offence was motivated by prejudices related to race, skin color, national or ethnic origin or ethnic affiliation, religious affiliation or non-denominational status, belief, political views, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, disability or another comparable basis. ¹⁴

In August 2019 the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination presented its Concluding observations on the combined twenty-second to twenty-fourth periodic reports of Poland. The

Committee recommends that the Poland i.e. should take all necessary measures to firmly combat racist hate speech and incitement to violence, including on the Internet, and publicly condemn and distance itself from racist hate speech by public figures, including politicians and media officials; intensify its public campaigns to combat hate speech, incitement to hatred and hate crimes, address prejudices and negative sentiments towards national and ethnic minorities, migrants, refugees, and asylum-seekers, and promote tolerance and understanding towards these groups; send strong messages to journalists and broadcasters that they have a responsibility to avoid the use of hate speech and stereotypes in describing minority communities, take action against websites promoting racial hatred and, particularly in the context of election campaigns, closely scrutinize broadcasters with respect to content that incites hatred or strengthens xenophobic attitudes; amend article 53 (2) of its Criminal Code, specifically making racist motive of a crime an aggravating circumstance and allowing for enhanced punishment to combat the occurrence of such acts.¹⁵

It is a continues problem that the political leaders in Poland use the notion of "otherness" with regard to migrants (Muslims, refugees) and the LGBT community to build the sense of national identity. The use of hateful rhetorics targeting these groups is particularly evident during the electoral campaigns., According to the Centre for the Monitoring of Racist and Xenophobic Behaviour¹⁶, words uttered by the leader of the ruling Law and Justice party (*Prawo i Sprawiedliwość*, *PiS*) at the party convention amounted to public insulting and threatening of a group of people. while the prosecutor's office considers such statements leniently, as declarations regarding the program of a political party.¹⁷ ¹⁸

Similar problems occurred last year, when a few days prior to the local elections, exactly on 17 October 2018, the Law and Justice party released a new anti-immigrant campaign advertisement. It depicted what Poland would look like in 2020 if the opposition came to power and pushed a pro-immigrant agenda: the advertisement envisaged violence, rioting on the streets and the total dissolution of Polish society. In reaction to this spot, the Ombudsman requested the District Prosecutor in Warsaw to initiate proceedings in order to determine whether the mentioned commercial aimed to spread hatred or other strong negative emotions towards migrants, refugees, people of Arab origin and Muslims. It specifically inquired whether it contained material amounting to public incitement of hatred based on national, ethnic or religious origin was committed which is a punishable offence. According to the law, a request submitted by the Ombudsman should not be subject to verification as part of pre-trial verification activities. Law enforcement agencies receiving such a request from the Ombudsman are obliged to immediately initiate preparatory proceedings in the case of offenses prosecuted *ex officio*²¹. Despite this legal obligation, in December 2018, the prosecutor's office refused to initiate a preparatory proceeding

in this case. The Ombudsman appealed to the court against the prosecutors' decision²². On 19 February 2019, the District Court in Warsaw-Mokotów considered the complaint of the Ombudsman as justified and found the decision of the prosecutor's office as premature. The District Court decided that the prosecution should, first of all, look more closely at the advertisement, and assess it, also with the help of experts (linguists and specialists in the social and political sciences), in the light of the electoral campaign. in which the spot appeared.²³ As a result in August 2019, the District Prosecutor in Warsaw refused again to initiate preparatory proceeding stating that the action described in the Ombudsman's request did not contain the elements of a criminal act. On 9 September 2019 the Ombudsman disagreed with the prosecutor's position and appealed again appealed to the court against the prosecutors' decision.²⁴

Chapter 3. Roma integration

1. Measures and developments addressing Roma/Travellers segregation

There are no new developments concerning Roma segregation in Poland. Roma communities in Poland by large live in separation, while the anti-Roma attitudes in the Polish society remain strong. According to the opinion polls, over half of the respondends feel aversion towards Roma. However, the attitudes of Poles towards this ethnic group slightly improved over the past two decades.²⁵

In some regions of Poland conflicts between Romani and non-Romani communities are ongoing, while the government funding for Romani integration projects is strongly contested by non-Roma and undermines the grounds for their peaceful co-existence as neighbours. The parliamentary committee for ethnic, religious and national minorities attempted to address this problem and requested the Minister of Internal Affairs to appoint a professional mediator to solve a conflict between Romani and non-Romani communities in the Lesser Poland Voivodeship. In the last couple of years, the reports published by both independent institutions, such as the Ombudsperson, or the media, indicated the tensions between Romani and non-Romani communities in cities such as Limanowa (concerning the condition of social housing for Romani community), Andrychów or Siemianowice Śląskie (attacks on Roma persons).²⁶ Nevertheless, the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Administration rejected this request twice. This reaction revealed that there is a tension between the Ministry of Internal Affairs and the committee on this matter.²⁷

The question of the government policy towards ethnic and national minories became relevant because a draft of a new Polish migration policy, a product of intergovernmental cooperation, was leaked to the press in June 2019. The document creates an image of Poland as a culturally, ethnically and religiously homogenous country. This vision poses a potential threat to the preservation of cultural identity of Roma communities in Poland in the future.²⁸

2. Policy and legal measures and developments directly or indirectly addressing Roma/Travellers inclusion

The National Roma integration programme 2014-2020 was implemented throughout 2019. Within the programme the focus is placed on 4 priority areas: housing, healthcare, employment and education. The funds are distributed at the voivodeship level and contribute to the realization of numerous local initiatives, carried out in by/ in cooperation with the Roma community. Nevertheless, little is known of

its actual impact, as there is no ongoing evaluation of the programme. In 2017 the Supreme Chamber of Control found out that the realization of the programme in one of the voideships was not effective for the integration of Roma. Instead it primarily served the goal of social aid and worked as a form of material support dedicated to Roma. For this reason, the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Administration has launched a call for proposals to commission an evaluation study to be finalised by the end of 2019, in order to measure the results and impact of the programme and to provide recommendations for its improvement.

The work of Roma school assistants is continuously funded under the Roma integration programme and praised for its effectiveness³¹. However, according to the Roma community, this professional group needs to be appropriately remunerated and repeatedly trained to achieve the desired impact in education³².

Among the cultural and remembrance projects implemented in the area of Roma inclusion, there were numerous activities addressing and commemorating Romani genocide in World War II. Remembrance ceremonies were organized in KL Auschwitz-Birkenau (with attendance of the Head of the Political Cabinet of the Prime Minister)³³ as well as in the Polin Museum³⁴.

on upon person's request.³⁹ The same legal provisions apply in this regard both to the unaccompanied children, adult and those children turning 18.

Unaccompanied children who did not apply for asylum, or after the final negative decision issued in the asylum process, have an opportunity to receive residence permits only based on the general legal provision. Such children may receive humanitarian stay permit or tolerated stay permit as a result of the return procedure⁴⁰ (ex. due to the risk of violation of the rights of the child as defined in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child; due to the risk of the violation of the family or private life as defined in the European Convention on Human Rights; due to the unenforceability of return); residence permit for the defined period of time even when they are residing in Poland irregularly⁴¹ (ex. due to the risk of violation of the rights of the child⁴²; due to the risk of the violation of the family or private life⁴³; due to being a victim of human trafficking if they are identified as such victim⁴⁴). Moreover, the Polish law indicates that a foreigner who has been irregularly staying on the territory may apply for the residence permit due to so-called 'other circumstances' within 1 year from the date on which he attained 18 if granting such permit 'is in his important interest '45 The national law provides examples of 'other circumstances' (ex. undertaking or continuing education or being a priest) but this is not a closed terms catalog and as a rule, it is directed to those residing regularly.⁴⁶ Those residing irregularly can be granted the residence permit for 'other circumstances' only in some particular situations listed above. 47 However, the adults staying irregularly cannot apply for the residence permit for 'other circumstances' based on the general provision and open catalog of 'other circumstances'. This legal provision allowing to apply for it when staying irregularly is directed only to young adults reaching 18.

The abovementioned provision applies to all foreigner including unaccompanied children.

Guardianship (representative under Reception Conditions Directive Article 24.1)

Please elaborate on how the role of guardians is affected when the child reaches 18, and of any initiatives to expand the guardian's support, for example transforming the guardian into a 'mentor' supporting the child until a certain age.

The Polish law provides for the appointment of a legal representative to an unaccompanied child and there are no exceptions in that regard. However, the guardian is only granted to children so after reaching 18 foreigners have to represent themselves in the administrative procedures (including asylum procedure). But it worth pointing out that due to the fact that the NGO workers are appointed as guardians (free of charge due to their willingness)⁴⁸, there is a possibility that unaccompanied child may receive some assistance from his guardian when turning 18 but this can only result from possibilities and goodwill of NGOs.

Accommodation

Reception Conditions Directive Article 24.2 Please explain what children reaching 18 years are entitled to in terms of accommodation, for example extension of foster care programmes until the age of 21, only transfer to an adult accommodation, or other accommodation support.

In Poland there are no selected specific foster care institutions where unaccompanied foreign children would be sent to, due to that unaccompanied children are placed in various intervention facilities in Poland. ⁴⁹ After the court ruling, they can be placed in foster care facilities or foster families. There is no special legal provision which applies to the unaccompanied foreign children who are turning 18 and general provisions apply. The issues related to assistance for children leaving foster care institutions are regulated in the Act on family support and foster care system. ⁵⁰ According to them the person leaving foster care after reaching 18 is entitled to receive assistance for continuation of education, for gaining independence and for establishing a household, to receive legal and psychological assistance and to obtain assistance in finding appropriate accommodation (living premises) and employment. The child leaving foster care has to choose the mentor of his self-empowermentat process at least a year prior to reaching the age of 18. Such assistance is provided under the condition that the child will present the individual independence program developed together with the mentor of self-empowermentat at least a month prior to reaching 18. The mentor of his self-empowermentat process supports the child, acts as an advisor and assistant. Such a person should have constant and friendly contact with the child, advise and inform how to arrange or settle basic matters. The mentor cooperates with the child, his

family, local community, school. From a formal point of view - the mentor is a party of the self-empowermentat process and develops, modifies and performs final assessment of it together with the young person. Furthermore, the mentor also provides opinions on applications for various forms of assistance provided by the Poviat Family Support Center⁵¹ which is competent to incur expenses for continuation of education, for gaining independence and for establishing a household. Assistance for continuation of education can be provided monthly until 25 years of age, assistance for gaining independence can be provided in one or in several installments until 26 years of age and assistance for establishing a household can be provided in one installment or in a form of material assistance, also only until 26 years of age. 52 However, such self-empowermentat assistance may be provided only to the foreign children in the asylum process, granted refugee status/subsidiary protection, the EU long-term residence permit. The catalog of eligible foreigners is closed and does not contain undocumented migrants or those in return procedures.⁵³ Please explain whether there are any special measures to prepare unaccompanied children for a return procedure Return and whether young adults receive any form of free assistance during eventual return procedures Return Directive, Article 10 According to Polish law, the decision on return issued to a child can be executed only: (1) if in the country of return, a child has the care of parents, other adults or guardianship institutions in accordance with the standards set out in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, (2) the return procedure takes place under the protection of the legal representative of the child or the child will be handed over to his legal representative or the representative of the competent authorities in the country of return.⁵⁴ However, there are no special measures to prepare unaccompanied children or young adults for a return procedure. In Poland, support to unaccompanied children returning to their country of origin is provided only by the International Organisation for Migration (IOM) under voluntary return

assistance program which provides assistance to vulnerable persons in voluntary returns to their country of origin (unaccompanied children are included in this group). In justified cases vulnerable persons received aid in the form of medical examinations for the purpose of the return journey and medical escort or ordinary escort (e.g. in case of unaccompanied child). Aside from organizing voluntary return IOM also provides support for reintegration in the country of origin in close cooperation with local IOM offices, adjusted to the individual needs of each beneficiary.

Chapter 5. Information society, data protection

1. Activities developed and launched by national data protection supervisory authorities (SAs) to implement and enforce the GDPR

In February 2019, the Parliament adopted a package of legislation that adjusted the provisions of over 160 legal acts in compliance with GDPR. The main changes concerned among others the processing of personal data by financial institutions or access of patients to their health and medical records. The law also amended some provisions of the Labour Code concerning excessive monitoring of employees and granting employees the right to refuse to provide information that is not necessary from the point of view of the employment contract. The law also introduced criminal provisions concerning the attempts to force ordering unnecessary service related to implementation of the GDPR. In the light of the new provisions, such an attempts will be treated as a illegal threat and will be punishable.⁵⁵

In April 2019, the Parliament appointed the new President of the Personal Data Protection Office. Two civil society organizations - the Panoptykon Foundation and Helsinki Foundation for Human Rights - monitored the process of appointing the new Chief of Personal Data Protection Office. In their appeal to the Speaker of Sejm, the organizations stated that the process of appointing the new DPA is carried out too quickly and does not provide a possibility for a debate on candidate's competences and his independence. The organizations pointed out at the doubts regarding candidate's professional knowledge and expertise which would make him suitable for this position. Also, his close ties to the governing majority provoked doubts regarding his independence. ⁵⁶

In May 2019, the Personal Data Protection Office published guidelines on administrators' duties related to the breaches of data protection. The Office data shows that the administrators notified the Office about the breach of personal data protection 4539 times within one year between 25 May 2018 and 25 May 2019. According to the Office's analysis, the administrators still have problems in assessing the risk for rights and freedoms of persons whose personal data protection was breached or in classifying an incident as a breach described in Article 33 of the GDPR. The published guidelines presents among others the duties which lays with the administrators and data processors, the examples of data protection breaches which has to be notified to the Personal Data Protection Office as well as required information which should be included into the

notification. The guidelines also summaries the information on notification the persons whose personal data protection was breached and the common mistakes usual done in this process.⁵⁷

According to the annual report of the Office of Personal Data Protection, in 2018 the Office received 5565 complaints whereas 4550 of them were submitted to the Office after 25 May 2018. However, in 2018, the Office dealt mainly with the cases in which the proceedings started before 25 May 2018 as their number was very significant (4417 proceedings). According to the information presented in the report, the implementation of GDPR "caused an increase in the number of submitted complaints and created new challenges for the administrators and supervising authority". As one of these challenges, the report mentions the fact that in many cases the persons whose personal data protection was breached contact the Office immediately without, however, trying to contact the data administrator first. Furthermore, when it comes to the implementation of GDPR, in 2018 the Personal Data Protection Office encourage professional groups to adopt codes of conduct. In this regard, the Office organized two workshops for representatives of different professional groups (including financing, telecommunication or medical university). The Office organized also 23 individual meetings with authors of the codes of conduct. In 2018, three organizations submitted motions for approving their codes of conduct (the Federation of Employees in the Health Sector, Union of Polish Banks and the Polish Hospital Federation).⁵⁸

In October 2019, the Polish Parliament agreed to ratify the Protocol amending the COE Convention for the protection of individuals with regard to automatic processing of personal data.⁵⁹

Chapter 6. Rights of the child

1. Procedural safeguards for children who are suspects in criminal proceedings

Legislative changes

In 2019, the Ministry of Justice presented a draft legislation changing the Act on juvenile proceedings. The draft legislation envisages a deep reform of the current proceedings in the case of juveniles. As in the case of the previous act, the draft is also based on the model of child upbringing and the best interests of the child. The draft legislation introduces the minimum age at which a child is criminally liable demoralization (10 years old). Furthermore, the draft legislation changes the provisions concerning the notification to the court or the police about the circumstances indicating child's demoralization. If there are any signs of demoralisation, the school principal, with the consent of the parents, may take educational measures. Secondly, if, for example, a police investigation reveals that a child has committed an offence, the police can only end the proceedings with a warning. The draft law also contains provisions on legal representation of children in proceedings. According to the draft, in this case the provisions of the Code of Civil Procedure regulating the legal representation should be applicable. This, however, may not be sufficient in practice. According to the Legislation Council of the Council of Ministers the provisions of the Code of Criminal Procedure on access to a defense lawyer should apply in cases involving juveniles.60

In addition, the draft law lays down the procedure for the arrest of a child. According to the draft, the court should be notified of the detention "as soon as possible" and within 24 hours. However, the same deadline does not apply to the notification of parents.

The draft legislation refers also to the administration of the facilities for juveniles and regulates the rights and duties of a child placed in such a facility.

The draft legislation is in the consultations phase and has not been presented to the Parliament yet.⁶¹

In 2019, the Parliament adopted a package of extensive changes to the Criminal Code. ⁶² The changes include among others the increase of criminal sanctions for sexual abuse of a child. In particular, the new law provides that for raping a child, paedophiles will be imprisoned for even 30 years, the most disturbed perpetrators will be threatened with absolute life imprisonment, and the most serious paedophilic

	crimes will never be time-barred. The changes also provide for the abolition of suspended sentences for paedophiles. Moreover, data on the profession of convicted persons will be revealed in the "register of paedophiles". The amendment leaves the limit of criminal protection against paedophile acts at the level of 15 years. The amendment also provides for a new flexible penalty system. These changes were adopted in reaction to public release of a film on paedophilia in the Polish clergy. According to the Ombudsman and some experts, the legislative procedure used to adopt the amendments was in breach of the Constitution, while many provisions violate international standards on merits. Before signing it, the President decided to direct the law to the
	Constitutional Tribunal. The law has not came into force yet.
Policy developments	There were no significant policy developments concerning the rights of children who are suspects in criminal proceedings.
Other measures or initiatives	In 2019, the Ombudsman's Office together with the National Bar Association, National Association of Solicitors, the Council of Europe, ODIHR and Association for the Prevention of Torture launched a campaign "The state without torture". The campaign's main aim was to raise the social awareness of forms of torture and who may become a victim of torture. Within the campaign, Ombudsman's office carried out a training titled "Torture, inhuman and degrading treatment in national and international law. Prevention of torture" for the representatives of the staff of the juvenile correction facilities. 65

2. Legal and policy measures or initiatives developed about child internet safety

In 2019, the Ministry of Digitalization and the Office of the Ombudsman organized a round table dedicated to the problem of harmful content published on-line. The problem attracted public attention after several media reports on the live streaming of harmful content which gained increasing popularity among children. According to the Empowering Children Foundation's report, 48% of children in age of 13-15 years old heard about the harmful content but did not watch it, whereas 37% of the respondents heard about such content and watched some of it. Upon the initiative of the Ombudsman's Office, stakeholders such as the Child's Rights Ombudsman, Minister of Digitalization and NGOs signed a declaration on combating the harmful online content and

listing the potential actions to be taken in this field. Among the suggested actions are collecting information on government's actions undertaken towards limiting the availability and presence of harmful content online, preparing a strategy for children's safety online and developing mechanisms improving blocking harmful content online.⁶⁶ In June 2019, the Minister of Digitalization announced that he would travel to each voivodeship in the country to discuss the problem of exposing children to harmful content online.⁶⁷

In October 2019, the National Broadcasting Council launched public consultations concerning the implementation of the Directive of audiovisual services 2018/1808 of 14 November 2018. Within the consultations, the Council prepared two questionnaires including questions on protection of audiovisual recipients of content, media education and codes of conduct. The consultations are addressed to all stakeholders and last until end of November 2019.⁶⁸

Chapter 7. Access to justice including crime victims

1. Victims' Rights Directive

Amendments to the Code of Criminal Procedure

A massive amendment to the Code of Criminal Procedure was adopted in July 2019 and came into force on 5 October 2019.⁶⁹ The new law changed numerous provisions of the Code, including those pertaining to the situation of crime victims. The latter are elaborated on below.

In cases arising from criminal offences prosecuted on motion (where proceedings shall be instituted ex officio at the moment of submitting the motion by the victim), in the court proceedings, the motion can be withdrawn, with the consent of the court, before the commencement of judicial examination within the first main trial. The amendment modifies this rule, first of all, by prolonging the time for withdrawal to the closure of judicial examination. Secondly, in cases where the indictment was brought by a public prosecutor, it requires for the withdrawal to take effect that the prosecutor, present at the hearing or session, does not object to it. In the Helsinki Foundation for Human Rights' (HFHR) opinion, this change is not necessary from the perspective of the victim's rights as it is sufficient that only the court should assess whether i.e. the victim's decision to withdraw the motion was taken at will.⁷⁰

The amendment also changes the procedure of assuming the role of subsidiary prosecutor by the injured party. According to the previous procedure, if the body conducting the investigation issues a decision on discontinuance of investigation or on refusal to institute it, the victim appeals against it to the court, the court revokes the decision and the body, still not finding grounds to bring the indictment, issues the second decision to the abovementioned effect, the victim may bring a subsidiary indictment. After the amendment came into force, in order to exercise the right to become a subsidiary prosecutor, the victim will have to appeal the second prosecutorial decision to the prosecutor of a higher level. This solution will lengthen the injured party's effort to indict the perpetrator and as such should be assessed negatively.

The amendment extends the catalogue of details that the record of an action shall not include (those data should be contained in an annex to the record, which shall be stored in an address annex to the case files for the information of the authority conducting the proceedings). Apart from the place of residence and the place of work of the injured person, there are also the telephone number, the fax number and the e-mail address of the victim.

The injured who as at the moment of questioning as a witness is under 15 years of age shall be questioned by court promptly but not later than within 14 days since obtaining the parties' motion for such questioning. In cases related to certain sexual offences, including rape, court will be able to question the victim as a witness, regardless of their age, only when their testimony could be of particular importance for the resolution of the case, and only once, unless significant circumstances are disclosed and there is a need of a repeated questioning to clarify them. The same 14-day term for questioning will apply to those cases. A statutory representative or an adult appointed by the victim will have a right to be present at the questioning.

The catalogue of means by which the victim is informed on the conclusion of the pro-ceedings has been broadened by fax and e-mail. Moreover, the advice of the injured party's rights will have to be delivered to the victim, even if the authority decides not to question them.

According to the amendment, it will be possible to withdraw from questioning the victim in the capacity of a witness unless this action is necessary to make findings of fact. The injured will have a right to demand to be questioned, except for the situation when it would lead to the lengthiness of the proceedings. In the HFHR's opinion, the provision should guarantee that the injured should always be questioned on demand so that the rights to be heard and to provide evidence, enshrined in the Victims' Rights Directive, are ensured.⁷¹

A copy of the injunctive judgment should now be served on the victim. The injured party will be advised that in order to effectively appeal against such judgement they are supposed to add a statement that they wish to act in the capacity of a subsidiary prosecutor.

The Justice Fund. Questionable practice of spending

The public Justice Fund, administered by the Minister of Justice, has been functioning since 2012 (under other name) and financing the activities of NGOs and other bodies, related with helping crime victims and witnesses, as well as post-penitentiary help. Its 2019 budget was 115.000.000 zlotys (approx. EUR 28.000.000).⁷²

A dramatic change to the functioning of the Fund occurred in 2017 through amendments to the Criminal Executive Code⁷³ and the regulation of the Minister of Justice⁷⁴. The amendments, first, extended the catalogue of entities that were eligible for subsidies by adding certain public bodies (e.g. courts, prosecution offices, the Police). Second, the functioning of the Fund should now serve the aim of "combating crime", which is a broad and imprecise term.

The practice of allocating the resources of the Fund on purposes other than helping crime victims has been raising questions for almost two years. It was raised that resources from the Fund were either granted to organisations of catholic profile on a large scale, or to foundations and associations linked to the governing party, especially the Minister of Justice (e.g. spent on political events).

In 2019, the Supreme Chamber of Control, the top audit body set up for scrutinising the expenses of public institutions in Poland, published its annual report, which covered among others the Justice Fund. The post-inspection report revealed the scale of questionable spending. It indicated that e.g. 24 million zlotys were spent, through a subsidy for an organisation, on commissioning reflective jackets with the Fund's logo that were sup-posed to be used in a campaign promoting safety in the streets at night. Out of almost 40.000.000 zlotys granted to various NGOs, more than 33.000.000 (which gives 86% of total sum of scrutinised expenses) have been spent, in the Chamber's opinion, "unreasonably or wastefully". 75

The 2019 report indicated also that extending the catalogue of activities financed by the Fund in 2017 has led to the marginalisation of its fundamental task – helping crime victims. Instead of that, the Fund concentrated on unjustified spending on purposes such as e.g. modernising sports centres or organising conferences on social, religious and philo-sophical issues. It was also stressed that, when granting resources to NGOs, the Fund did not verify their experience. As a consequence, millions were allocated to entities prepared inadequately for functioning.⁷⁶

2. Violence against women

Poland still has not implemented an effective protection system to address violence against women. It is estimated that the scale of such violence in Poland is significant - a 2014 research shows that 19% of women in Poland have experienced physical or sexual assault from their ex-partner or another person.⁷⁷

Polish criminal law, to begin with, lacks a specific type of crime of domestic or gender related violence. The existing provision of Article 207 of the Criminal Code provides only for a crime of physical or mental maltreatment of an immediate family member or another person being in a

permanent or temporary relation of dependence to the perpe-trator. A perpetrator of this crime is subject to deprivation of liberty for between 3 months to 5 years.⁷⁸

Moreover, on 31 December 2018, Polish Ministry of Family, Labour and Social Policy proposed an amendment to the Act on combating domestic violence of 29 July 2005. The amendment included several controversial changes that in general weakened the protection of victims of domestic violence – the vast majority of whom are women. In particular, it altered the definition of domestic abuse by stating that it should relate only to recurring acts of violence, and made the continuation of a special procedure of report-ing a violation dependent on the victim's consent. After a wave of criticism from, among others, the opposition and civil society, Polish prime minister informed, on 2 January 2019, that the government would withdraw from the project.

In July 2019 a problem concerning data protection in the context of domestic violence was noticed by the President of the Personal Data Protection Office. In a letter to the Minister of Family, Labour and Social Policy, the President indicated that, according to the existing domestic regulations, it is not clear what documents gathered during the so called "Blue Card procedure" (a procedure related to reporting domestic violence) can be accessed by the victims and perpetrators of the crime. ⁸⁰ The President suggested that the act should be amended so its provisions are more precise, concerning in particular the catalogue of exemptions of access, and stressing the need of ensuring compliance with the General Data Protection Regulation. The Minister replied that an adequate amendment was going to be considered (however, it has not been adopted as for the moment of writing). ⁸¹

In June 2019 the Ministry of Justice announced a draft amendment to several acts, including the Code of civil procedure and the Act on combating domestic violence. ⁸² The main objective of this complex solution was to strengthen the protection of victims of domestic violence by isolating the perpetrators from the victims. To obtain this objective, the act would entitle the Police to assess the actual threat posed by the perpetrator and to issue an order to leave the premises unconditionally if certain danger occurs, regardless of the lack of any other place to go (in such case, the officer should inform the person on available shelters). Police officers could also issue restraining orders with regard to the perpetrators of domestic violence and check if they abide by such restrictions. Also, the courts' orders to leave the premises, issued upon a free-of-charge motion, would be immediately enforceable. The proposed amendment has not been adopted as of yet.

Several issues can be raised concerning administration of justice in domestic and gender related violence cases. First, it should be noted that a relatively small amount of cases concludes with

conviction of the perpetrators for the penalty of deprivation of liberty without the conditional suspension of its enforcement (only 2.406 cases out of total 10.031 convictions for the crime of cruelty to a family member in 2017).83 Secondly, total number of penal measures of prohibition from approaching to certain individuals imposed on perpetrators in such cases is rather insignificant, too (in 2017 courts imposed 2.528 such measures).84 Furthermore, the existing mechanisms for isolating perpetrators from victims – either by preventive measures taken in criminal proceedings, or by orders to leave the premises issued in civil proceedings, does not prove to be effective.

Poland also lacks an efficacious system of support for victims of domestic abuse. The Ministry of Family, Labour and Social Policy estimates that even 75% of such persons did not apply for any kind of help. 85 To make the matters worse, since 2016 the Ministry of Justice has been persistently refusing to continue the subsidy for certain NGOs that deal with women's rights, making the protection of victims even weaker.86

Chapter 8. Developments in the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

1. CRPD policy & legal developments

In 2019, there were no significant legal developments concerning the rights of persons with disabilities. The adopted in 2019 policies concerning the situation of persons with disabilities primarily focused on their functioning in the society, access to labour market and accessibility.

In 2019, the Ministry of Family, Labour and Social Policy launched a program "The assistant of a person with disabilities". The first edition of the program is designed for one year (until 31 December 2020). The program main aim is to provide to persons with disabilities with an assistant who would help them in the daily life activities. The program is addressed to persons with significant or mild disability. The assistants will be persons with certified skills and knowledge on needs of persons with disabilities. The access to the aid of an assistant will be free of charge.⁸⁷

The Ministry of Family, Labour and Social Policy also announced the main points of the program "For Life" which is designed to support families of persons with disabilities. According to the Minister of Family, Labour and Social Policy the program for years 2017-2021 will include the priority for developing the protected apartments which are adjusted to the needs of persons with disabilities. In years 2017-2018, 80 apartments were constructed within the frames of the program "For Life". At the same time, the government is working on the strategy on deinstitutionalization of the care of persons with disabilities. According to the information provided to the Ombudsman, the strategy should be ready by 2020. 89

In 2019, the Accessibility Council started its works. The Council was established by the Minister of Investigations and Development as a consultative body. In 2019, the Council has had two sessions. The first meeting of the Council was dedicated to discussing the progress in works on the draft legislation on Act on accessibility. The second session was dedicated to progress in the implementation of the program "Accessibility Plus", draft proposal to changes in the regulation of the Ministry of Infrastructure concerning the accessibility of buildings and Accessibility standards for health care institutions. In the beginning of 2019, the Ministry of Family, Labour and Social Policy informed the Ombudsman that the draft project of the "Strategy for persons with disabilities for years 2018-2030" will be sent to consultations in February/March 2019. The adoption of such a strategy was one of the recommendations presented by the Committee for Persons with Disabilities to Polish government in 2018. However, there is no available data whether the consultations on the strategy were in fact organised in 2019.⁹²

When it comes to improving the accessibility, the Polish Ministry of Investment and Development starts its works on implementation of the European Accessibility Act. In October 2019, the Ministry plans to start the process of formal consultations with different stakeholders (including state institutions and social partners).⁹³

In 2019, there were no legal changes concerning the incapacitation. Despite numerous calls from the Ombudsman or civil society oragnizations, the Ministry of Justice still has not prepared a draft legislation abolishing the institution of full incapacitation.⁹⁴

The Supreme Court determined that religious convictions did not constitute a ,justified cause'. As a result the Prosecutor General referred the case to the Constitutional Tribunal which ruled that the printer who refused to print a roll-up banner for an LGBT NGO due to his religious beliefs should not have been convicted because workers have a right to act according to their conscience. The Constitutional Tribunal found the Article 138 of the Petty Offence Act, punishing for unjustified refusal to perform the service, as incompatible with the Constitution. The Tribunal stated, that the term "without justified cause" cannot be clearly defined, therefore, penalizing the refusal to provide services without a justified cause constitutes an interference with the freedoms of the service provider, in particular, contractual freedom, the right to express one's own opinions or to act in accordance with one's own conscience. The reporting Judge added that fighting
	against discrimination cannot be done at the price of these freedoms. ¹⁰⁰ Consequently, the Tribunal decided that Article 138 of
	the Petty Offence Act is unconstitutional.
Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	According to the Ombudsman who took part in this process before the Constitutional Tribunal, the Article 138 of the Petty Offence Act which became unconstitutional prevented discrimination for any reason and now the parliament should shape the law system in such a way as to effectively prevent the segregation of clients in the services market due to their personal characteristics, such as gender, age, race, nationality, disability or sexual orientation. This article implemented the Racial Equality Directive, by transposing the principle of equal treatment between persons irrespective of racial or ethnic origin. Many EU Member States provide for criminal sanctions for violating the prohibition of discrimination in access to services and not only a fine, but up to 6 months imprisonment. The Ombudsman also pointed to well-established case-law of national courts and the ECtHR, indicating that not every act motivated or inspired by religion or beliefs is protected by law. ¹⁰¹

Key facts of the case (max. 500 chars)	The Limanowa municipality, has bought a building in the town of Czchow with the aim to accommodate Roma families, who were at the time living in substandard living conditions in communal building of Limanowa. The families and the municipality have signed a binding contract, at a notary public, in which Roma families committed to vacate the communal building of Limanowa and move to Czchow. The contract could be enforced with the assistance of a baillif, should need be. The building in Limanowa was about to be demolished, as the municipality deemed it too costly to renovate.
Main reasoning/argumentation (max. 500 chars)	The II instance court (District Court in Nowy Sącz) ruled that the enforcement of the contract (i.e. eviction) would violate the constitutional proportionality rule by interfering with Roma families private life and their right to choose a place of their residence. Roma families were forced by the municipality into signing a contract with the aim to bypass provisions obliging the city to provide alternative accommodation within the Limanowa territory (and not in Czchow) and also it was misleading towards the Roma, who were not informed about their right to demand such an alternative accommodation.

The voivodeship court adjudicated in the case concerning the resolution of Warsaw City Council which set a legal basis for providing cars' registration plates while paying the fee for the parking in the city. According to the applicant, M.S., such a requirement provided an unjustified integration in the right of privacy as car's registration plate constitute a personal data. The Voivodeship Court decided that the number of registration plate can be used to identify a person hence it should be treated as a personal data and decided that the provisions of the City Council's resolution are not in compliance with the Constitution hence they should be declared void. The City Council appealed against this decision to the Supreme Administrative Court.

According to the Supreme Administrative Court in the courts' jurisprudence there are two ways of interpreting the number license plate as personal data. On one hand, the registration plate is used primarily to identify a car and a car can be used by several persons. Hence, in such a case, it is not easy to link a car to a specific person. On the other hand, however, in some cases the

In the opinion of the NGO, the Supreme Administrative Court's decision may not be in compliance with GDPR and may be a beginning of long legal disputes in which business entities will use this decision.104

Key facts of the case	In June 2018, the Provincial Administrative Court in Kraków has decided the case involving the transcription of a foreign birth certificate in which two women are listed as parents. The court ruled
(max. 500 chars)	that the Head of a Register Office correctly implemented the decision of the Supreme Administrative Court by registering the birth certificate in the Polish civil registry records. The case originated in 2015 when child's mother filed a motion to the Head of a Register
	Office to transcribe the birth certificate of her child born in the UK.

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Main reasoning/argumentation (max. 500 chars) Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	The original birth certificate indicates the applicant as a mother and her partner, a women, in the section "parent". In the beginning the Head of the Register Office refused to transcribe the act, however in 2018 the Supreme Administrative Court ruled that there were no reasons to refuse the full transcription of the act (the Court found that the refusal to transcribe the birth certificate would violate child's rights0. On the basis of this judgement, the Head of Register Office transcribed the birth certificate, however in January 2019 a prosecutor with the Circuit Prosecutor's Office in Kraków challenges the transcription in a complaint submitted to the Provincial Administrative Court in Kraków. The Provincial Administrative Court in Kraków dismissed prosecutor's complaint in June 2019. The Court decided that the main problem in this case concerns the protection of child's best interest and rights. Without the transcription of the birth certificate, the child would not acquire the Polish citizenship and would not be entitled to any rights derived from the citizenship. In the opinion of the Court, the duty to transcribe the birth certificate is a part of a broader system of protection child's rights set by the Polish Constitution, the UN Convention on Child's Rights or the European Convention of Human Rights. Yet again, the administrative court dealt with the case of transcription of a foreing birth certificate indicating partners of the same sex as child's parents. The Court decided that the lack of the full implementation of the certificate woul constitute child's rights violation.
Results (sanctions) and key consequences or implications of the case (max. 500 chars)	The transcription of a birth certificate was fully implemented.

Key facts of the case (max. 500 chars)	A partially incapacitated person wanted to participate in the European Parliament elections scheduled for 26 May 2019. This was not possible because he considered a partially incapacitated person under Polish law and, according to the provisions of the Electoral Code, such persons do not have electoral rights and are not included in the voters register. The man first submitted an official objection to an error in the voters register to the mayor of Nowy Sącz, demanding his name to be added to the register. As the mayor refused to admit his objection, an applicant filed a complaint to the court.
Main reasoning/argumentation (max. 500 chars)	In his submissions, the complainant stressed that Polish law was incompatible with international and EU law. In the opinion of applicant's lawyers the elections to the European Parliament must be universal and the EU law prohibits any discrimination against persons with disabilities.
Key issues (concepts, interpretations) clarified by the case (max. 500 chars)	The court noted that a disability cannot limit the exercise of electoral rights and found that the mechanism of automatic disenfranchisement was flawed. Exclusion from participation in elections should be preceded by an individual assessment of the situation of the person concerned. The court also emphasised that the Polish legislation is inconsistent: the law allows incapacitated persons to join political parties but forbids them to vote for their leaders. At the same time, the court stated that the current design of the measure of legal incapacitation does not match the realities of the present time.
Results (sanctions) and key consequences or implications of the case (max. 500 chars)	On the basis of this judgement, the decision of the city mayor was void and the applicant could participate in the EU elections.
