Ethnic profiling	PGPD Plataforma por la Gestión Policial de la Diversidad and Open Society Justice Initiative	Five Spanish police services (Fuenlabrada, Castellón, Pedrezuela, Girona and Mossos d'esquadra), undertook a program of reforms aimed at reducing the use of ethnic profiles and increase the effectiveness and impartiality of the identifications and the police records. The project concluded that change is not only possible, but it is profitable and sustainable. The needed reforms pose a challenge: they imply a considerable workload, require skills and specialized knowledge, as well as a meaningful partnership between the police and members of the civil society. Reforms usually face the resistance of the service staff and the commitment of high level command is necessary.	The Pilot projects used the collection and analysis of data to monitor and reduce the use of ethnic profiles. It included: workshops with groups and police and joint dialogue activities; the introduction and the use of forms of identification to document every ID or registration carried out, including ethnic data or nationality of the person identified; delivery of a copy of the form to the identified individual, the training of police officers in carrying out identification and use of forms; the review and periodic analysis of the forms of identification by the police monitors; the dissemination of analyses of the IDs and records to the members of the groups; and the incorporation of indicators and measurements of IDs and records on the design and operations of the guidelines.
