Compared to the previous year there was a 52 % increase in suspected hate crimes. The clear majority (79,3 %) of the cases were classified as racist incidents. The rest of the cases had following motives: religion or corresponding motive (10,6 %), sexual orientation (4,4 %), disability (5,2 %) and gender-identity or gender expression (0,5 %). In 2015, 991 reports of offences with racist motives were found in the police information system. The most common suspected crimes were assaults. In 2015, in the majority of hate crimes based on religion, the target religion was Islam (71 cases) whereas the motive was related to Christianity in 18 cases, to other religions in 15 cases and the religion was not specified in 29 cases. The most common suspected crimes were verbal insults or threats. The police should use hate motive code whenever hate motive is suspected in a case. However, the code was used only in 18 % of the cases selected for the report.	The statistics are based on crime reports retrieved from the national police information system using search words and codes, after which the reports of an offence are read and classified as hate crime (or not) according to the specific information found on the reports, for example if the victim or the police has suspected that there was a hate motive behind the crime.	1,250 reports of an offence were selected from the raw material and classified as hate crime.
