Furthermore, 2 demonstrations against "Germany's Islamisation" that were allegedly influenced by right-wing extremists were counted by the domestic intelligence authorities. An update of the prior report on Anti-Muslim crimes in the third quarter of 2019 (German Bundestag 19/15647) shows: In total 271 crimes under the subtopic "hostile to Islam" were registered, 33 of them were assaults against mosques and 12 people were injured.	Figures were drawn from the police crime statistics (Polizeiliche Kriminalstatistik) on "politically motivated crime" (politisch motivierte Kriminalität) which includes "hostile to Islam" (islamfeindlich) as a new category since January 2017.
