In 2018, 562 police reports concerned such crimes, which was a 28 % increase compared to 2016. Statistics show that the number of police reports on hate crimes with Islamophobic motives were at a relatively stable level between the years 2008 and 2013. Since then there has been a yearly increase up until 2018. The most common types of hate crimes with Islamophobic motives in 2018 were unlawful threats and molestation (39 %), followed by agitation against an ethnic or national group (32 %). Violent crimes represented about 6 %.	Quantitative (Examination and analysis of police reports of hate crimes)	The target population for the survey was police reports from 2018 relating to the crime categories: violent crime (homicide, attempted homicide, assault and assault against a public servant), unlawful threat, non-sexual molestation, defamation, criminal damage, graffiti, agitation against a population group, unlawful discrimination and a selection of other offences. The sample was a simple random sample with a sample size of 50 % of the population, drawn two months subsequent to the end of the month in which the police report was registered. Of a total of 398,000 police reports for the full year, the sample comprised 197,000 reports, to which the computerised search was applied. The computerised search was based on a list of 383 search words relating to a number of specific crime categories. Reports identified by this computerised search method were studied manually in three steps. Details of reports considered to meet the authority's definition of a hate crime were coded. Finally, an estimation procedure was applied to produce population-level estimates based on the random sample of police reports examined. These population-level estimates constituted the statistics on police reports with identified hate crime motives.	Not applicable - national level
