The main reasons for their lost sense of security were troublemakers in the vicinity of the premises, vandalism, inadequate transport arrangements, and poor lighting or lack of lighting outside the premises. Some 63 % of Muslim respondents held that hate speech in social media affects their sense of security when practising their religion, to the effect that they have changed their behaviour. For example, they do not visit their religious premises alone or when it is dark and they do not take their children to the premises. Violence or threat of violence in the vicinity of the religious premises had been experienced by 18 % of Muslim respondents. Some 29 % had witnessed violence or threat of violence encountered by another person outside the premises. The most common form of violence reported by the Muslim respondents was verbal abuse.	An online survey was sent to all religious communities operating in Finland. The survey was open between 2 November 2020 and 7 December 2020. There were both multiple-choice and open-ended questions. Responses could be given in: Finnish, Swedish, English, Arabic, Somali and Farsi.	A total of 309 responses were received. Of these, 40 % were Muslim respondents. A majority (74 %) of the Muslim respondents were those attending religious services, the rest were either religious leaders (5 %) or assisted in (21 %) religious services. The analysis is statistically representative for Christian and Islamic communities, whereas for the Jewish community, the response rate was low.	Not applicable - national level
