Overall, 78% of respondents (strongly) agreed that democracy is the best form of government, and 82% (strongly) agreed that religion and politics should be separate. However, Muslims that had been personally discriminated against were significantly more supportive of violence in defence of Islam, more supportive of Islamism and less supportive of democracy and secularism.
