Racism or xenophobia against foreigners, particularly non-whites and non-Christians and especially Muslims was defined as the first of three obstacles society erects in the way of the social and economic advancement of young people of immigrant origin. The significance of culture varies greatly depending on origin and gender. This is the case with religion, particularly with the Muslim faith, which is greatly stigmatised in Spain. When diversity is discuss, the non-conflicting aspects of cultures, such as cuisine, music, traditions, and street usage are considered. Certain basic characteristics—like polygamy—are outright prohibited, while others are suspiciously perceived as outward expressions of Islam.
