Discrimination	Mirovni inštitut (Peace Institute)	The national equality body commissioned a targeted research project relating to the grounds of race, ethnic origin and religious affiliation. The research initiative involved several methodological approaches. An online survey resulted in 818 questionnaires adequate for further analysis. Among respondents who declared themselves as Muslims (N=16), 56.3 % claimed that they experienced discrimination at some point in the five years before the survey was administered. The research initiative also involved situation testing via e-mail and telephone. This exercise, which often involved a Muslim-sounding tester's name, indicated that access to employment and rental housing were the most problematic fields of life as regards the risk of discrimination. Semi-structured research interviews with experts for different grounds of discrimination and with persons with migrant background, which were also part of the project, indicated again the field of employment as particularly problematic. Some interviewees also mentioned instances of police profiling most heavily targeting persons with refugee background.	a) Quantitative - online survey, b) Qualitative - situation testing: because of the pandemic, the research was carried out via email (access to employment and a primary care physician), via telephone (access to rental housing), and by both email and telephone (access to education), c) Qualitative - semi-structured interviews.
