Children in Europe and neighbouring countries continue to have their rights violated. Yet, only a fraction of them have access to a fair, timely and effective remedy - in other words, very few have access to justice. Justice systems that are not adapted risk victimising children for a second time, doing more harm than providing redress.

What do we know about children in contact with justice systems in EU Members States? How do children experience access to justice in enlargement and Eastern neighbourhood countries? What has been tried and what works in assisting the most vulnerable children in claiming their rights?

This debate is timely as it happens in the morning of the **9th European Forum on the Rights of the Child** dedicated to child protection systems in Europe.
